#### **Declarations of Interest**

### **Disclosable Pecuniary Interest (DPI)**

Where a Member has a new or registered DPI in a matter under consideration they must disclose that they have an interest and, unless the Monitoring Officer has agreed in advance that the DPI is a 'Sensitive Interest', explain the nature of that interest at the meeting. The Member must withdraw from the meeting at the commencement of the consideration of any matter in which they have declared a DPI and must not participate in any discussion of, or vote taken on, the matter unless they have been granted a dispensation permitting them to do so. If during the consideration of any item a Member becomes aware that they have a DPI in the matter they should declare the interest immediately and, subject to any dispensations, withdraw from the meeting.

### Other Significant Interest (OSI)

Where a Member is declaring an OSI they must also disclose the interest and explain the nature of the interest at the meeting. The Member must withdraw from the meeting at the commencement of the consideration of any matter in which they have declared a OSI and must not participate in any discussion of, or vote taken on, the matter unless they have been granted a dispensation to do so or the meeting is one at which members of the public are permitted to speak for the purpose of making representations, answering questions or giving evidence relating to the matter. In the latter case, the Member may only participate on the same basis as a member of the public and cannot participate in any discussion of, or vote taken on, the matter and must withdraw from the meeting in accordance with the Council's procedure rules.

### **Voluntary Announcement of Other Interests (VAOI)**

Where a Member does not have either a DPI or OSI but is of the opinion that for transparency reasons alone s/he should make an announcement in respect of a matter under consideration, they can make a VAOI. A Member declaring a VAOI may still remain at the meeting and vote on the matter under consideration.

### Note to the Code:

Situations in which a Member may wish to make a VAOI include membership of outside bodies that have made representations on agenda items; where a Member knows a person involved, but does not have a close association with that person; or where an item would affect the well-being of a Member, relative, close associate, employer, etc. but not his/her financial position. It should be emphasised that an effect on the financial position of a Member, relative, close associate, employer, etc OR an application made by a Member, relative, close associate, employer, etc would both probably constitute either an OSI or in some cases a DPI.

**SUBJECT:** An application for a Review of a Premises Licence in respect of:

**Palmarsh Garage** 

**SUMMARY:** This report outlines the application made by Home Office -Immigration Enforcement, for a Review of the Premises Licence at a Petrol Garage in Palmarsh following enforcement action taken by them. The Licensing Sub-Committee must determine the outcome for the application.

### **REASONS FOR DETERMINATION:**

The Committee is asked to consider the Review application for the Premises Licence. When considering the application the Committee must ensure they fully promote the licensing objectives. The Committee is obliged to have regard to the revised national section 182 guidance and the council's own licensing policy.

### **DETERMINATION:**

The Licensing Sub-Committee is asked to:

- 1. Note the contents of Report DCL/21/49.
- 2. Determine the application. The options for determining the application are set out in section 5.

#### 1. BACKGROUND

1.1 The Licensing Act 2003 provides that the sale or supply of alcohol on and off the premises and other licensable activities must be authorised by a premises licence.

A premises licence holder must comply with the four licensing objectives:

- The prevention of crime and disorder
- Public Safety
- The prevention of public nuisance
- The protection of children from harm
- 1.2 The premises at Palmarsh Garage, Dymchurch Road, Palmarsh, Kent CT21 4ND has held a licence since 2008. The previous Premises Licence holder and Designated Premises Supervisor was Mr Arunthavarajah Suntharalingham. He left the premises in September 2020, unfortunately the licence was not correctly transferred to us until recently but the new owner, Mr Hyat Sultan, has been managing the premises since September 2020 and has very recently applied for Mrs Fredia Hayat to be the DPS (yet to be processed). A copy of the current licence can be found at Appendix 1.

### 2. APPLICATION

- 2.1 An application to Review the Premises Licence has been received from the Home Office Immigration Enforcement. The application and accompanying witness statements can be found at Appendix 2.
- 2.2. The application sets out the enforcement action taken by the Home Office on the 5<sup>th</sup> August 2021 having received intelligence that illegal working was taking place at Palmarsh Garage.
- 2.3. Upon entry by Immigration Officers, there was no employee present serving customers. From speaking with a customer filling up their car on the forecourt she stated that the sole employee had run off upon seeing their approach and therefore was believed to have been working illegally at the premise.
- 2.4. Leaving a licensed premises open and unattended where children could enter and obtain alcohol is a serious breach of the licensing objective to protect children from harm.
- 2.5. Due to the identity of the employee being unclear the Home Office were unable to take further action against the employee.

### 3. IMMIGRATION INFORMATION

- 3.1 The employment of people who do not have the right to work in the UK is a serious crime and can be linked to the exploitation of vulnerable people.
- 3.2 Employing people without making the legally required checks demonstrates that the premises licence holder is not robust and does not take his responsibilities or the licensing objectives seriously.
- 3.3 Working illegally is a criminal offence and on conviction an illegal worker may receive a custodial sentence of up to 6 months and an unlimited fine.
- 3.4 An employer who employs an illegal worker may be liable for a civil penalty of up to £20,000 per illegal worker and an employer who knowingly or has reasonable cause to believe that employment is not permitted, may on conviction after indictment, be subject to a custodial sentence of up to five years, and an unlimited fine.
- 3.5 The Home Office (Immigration Enforcement) have submitted this application to Review the premises licence due to the significant risk that the licensing objective of preventing crime and disorder is being undermined.
- 3.6 The Immigration Act 2016 brought in amendments to the Licensing Act 2003 relating to illegal working. Under Schedule 4, Section 5 it states that a premises licence may be revoked if considered appropriate for the promotion of the crime prevention objective, in order to prevent illegal working.
- 3.7 The Home Office Guidance issued under section 182 of the Licensing Act 2003 states: It is envisaged that licensing authorities, the Police, the Home Office (Immigration Enforcement) and other law enforcement agencies, which are responsible authorities, will use the review procedures effectively to deter such activities and crime. Where reviews arise and the licensing authority determines that the crime prevention objective is being undermined through the premises being used to further crimes, it is expected that revocation of the licence even in the first instance should be seriously considered.

  - c) Add conditions to the Licence
  - d) Exclude a licensable activity
  - e) Remove the DPS
  - f) Suspend the Licence for a period up to 3 months
  - a) Revoke the Licence
- 5.2. The Committee is asked to note that it may not add conditions or revoke the licence merely because it considers it desirable to do so. The Committee must only consider evidence that relates to the 4 Licensing Objectives. Any conditions added must promote the Licensing Objectives.

### **Annex 1- Mandatory Conditions**

### Mandatory conditions where licence authorises supply of alcohol

- (1) Where a premises licence authorises the supply of alcohol, the licence must include the following conditions.
- (2) The first condition is that no supply of alcohol may be made under the premises licence-
  - (a) at a time when there is no designated premises supervisor in respect of the premises licence, or
  - (b) at a time when the designated premises supervisor does not hold a personal licence or his personal licence is suspended.
- (3) The second condition is that every supply of alcohol under the premises licence must be made or authorised by a person who holds a personal licence.

#### Hotel/Residential

There are no restrictions on the times when intoxicating drink may be served to residents, including resident staff, in premises holding a residential licence. However non-residents eating a meal in premises holding a residential and restaurant licence are subject to permitted hours, unless they are being entertained as guests of a resident

#### **MANDATORY LICENSING CONDITIONS ORDER 2010**

1.

- 1) The responsible person shall take all reasonable steps to ensure that staff on relevant premises do not carry out, arrange or participate in any irresponsible promotions in relation to the premises.
- (2) In this paragraph, an irresponsible promotion means any one or more of the following activities, or substantially similar activities, carried on for the purpose of encouraging the sale or supply of alcohol for consumption on the premises in a manner which carries a significant risk of leading or contributing to crime and disorder, prejudice to public safety, public nuisance, or harm to children—
- (a) games or other activities which require or encourage, or are designed to require or encourage, individuals to—
  (i) drink a quantity of alcohol within a time limit (other than to drink alcohol sold or supplied on the premises before the cessation of the period in which the responsible person is authorised to sell or supply alcohol), or
  (ii) drink as much alcohol as possible (whether within a time limit or otherwise);
- (b) provision of unlimited or unspecified quantities of alcohol free or for a fixed or discounted fee to the public or to a group defined by a particular characteristic (other than any promotion or discount available to an individual in respect of alcohol for consumption at a table meal, as defined in section 159 of the Act);
- (c) provision of free or discounted alcohol or any other thing as a prize to encourage or reward the purchase and consumption of alcohol over a period of 24 hours or less;
- (d) provision of free or discounted alcohol in relation to the viewing on the premises of a sporting event, where that provision is dependent on—
- (i) the outcome of a race, competition or other event or process, or
- (ii) the likelihood of anything occurring or not occurring;
- (e) selling or supplying alcohol in association with promotional posters or flyers on, or in the vicinity of, the premises which can reasonably be considered to condone, encourage or glamorise anti-social behaviour or to refer to the effects of drunkenness in any favourable manner.
- 2.

The responsible person shall ensure that no alcohol is dispensed directly by one person into the mouth of another (other than where that other person is unable to drink without assistance by reason of a disability).

3.

The responsible person shall ensure that free tap water is provided on request to customers where it is reasonably available.

#### 4.

- (1) The premises licence holder or club premises certificate holder shall ensure that an age verification policy applies to the premises in relation to the sale or supply of alcohol.
- (2) The policy must require individuals who appear to the responsible person to be under 18 years of age (or such older age as may be specified in the policy) to produce on request, before being served alcohol, identification bearing their photograph, date of birth and a holographic mark.
- 5.

The responsible person shall ensure that-

(a) where any of the following alcoholic drinks is sold or supplied for consumption on the premises (other than

alcoholic drinks sold or supplied having been made up in advance ready for sale or supply in a securely closed container) it is available to customers in the following measures—

(i) beer or cider: ½ pint;

- (ii) gin, rum, vodka or whisky: 25 ml or 35 ml; and
- (iii) still wine in a glass: 125 ml; and
- (b) customers are made aware of the availability of these measures.

# Representation in respect of **Palmarsh Garage**, **Dymchurch Road**, **Hythe**, **Kent CT21 4ND**

An Immigration Enforcement visit was conducted on Thursday 5<sup>th</sup> August 2021 when upon entry there was no employee present serving. From speaking with a customer filling up their car on the forecourt she stated that the sole employee had run off upon seeing our approach and therefore believed to have been working illegally at the premise.

This fact was reinforced speaking to the son of the owner, Farris SULTAN, via telephone, who stated it was only himself and his brother and another two females who worked at the premise. He was unable to satisfactorily explain who the male employee was who made off from the premise upon our approach. Furthermore, the premise was unattended until this call finished and he was able to get one of the females to attend. However, she was unable to work the till and it was not until the owner of Minty's Motors (situated next to the subject premise) Andrew QUINN arrived, that the customer originally spoken to by officers was able to pay for her fuel.

The employment of people who do not have the right to work in the UK is a serious crime and can be linked to exploitation of vulnerable people.

Employing people without making the legally required checks demonstrates that the premises licence holder is not robust and does not take the responsibilities towards the licensing objectives seriously.

The ability to work illegally is a key driver of illegal migration; it encourages people to break the UK's immigration laws and provides the practical means for migrants to remain unlawfully in the UK.

It encourages people to take risks in trying to enter the UK illegally by putting their lives in the hands of unscrupulous people smugglers and leaves them vulnerable to exploitative employers.

Illegal working results in businesses that are not playing by the rules undercutting legitimate businesses that are. It also negatively impacts on the wages of lawful workers and can be linked to other labour market abuse such as tax evasion, breach of the national minimum wage and exploitative working conditions.

Working illegally is a criminal offence and on conviction in England and Wales, an illegal worker may receive a custodial sentence of up to six months and an unlimited fine.

We are committed to tackling the economic motivation behind illegal migration and those people who facilitate it. However, employers also have an important role to play in preventing illegal working by undertaking simple checks on their employees' right to work in the UK.

Employers have had a responsibility since 1997 to ensure they do not employ illegal workers. Since 2008, this requirement has been underpinned by civil and criminal sanctions for non-compliance, set out in the Immigration, Asylum and Nationality Act 2006 - sections 15 and 21. Under these sanctions, an

employer who employs an illegal worker may be liable for a civil penalty of up to £20,000 per illegal worker and an employer who knowingly or has reasonable cause to believe that the employment is not permitted may on conviction after indictment be subject to a custodial sentence of up to five years and an unlimited fine.

Employers may prevent a liability for a civil penalty by undertaking simple right to work checks on all those they intend to employ and repeating the checks if the employee has time-limited permission to live and work in the UK.

In order for CPCT to issue a civil penalty, they must be satisfied that an employer (who has not established a statutory excuse) has employed an individual subject to immigration control who is not permitted to do the work in question. For the purposes of the civil penalty scheme (s15 of the Immigration, Asylum and Nationality Act 2006) 'employment' is defined in s25 of this Act and unless this employment relationship can be demonstrated on a balance of probabilities, the civil penalty will fail following an objection and/or an appeal even if it is clear that illegal work has taken place. In this respect 'employment' is not the same as 'work'. The employment of people who do not have the right to work in the UK is a serious crime and can be linked to exploitation of vulnerable people.

The Home Office (Immigration Enforcement) has presented this evidence to inform the licensing committee's consideration and to draw to its attention the significant risk that the licensing objective of preventing crime and disorder is being undermined.

He stated that the only employees should be himself, his two sons (Farris SULTAN b. 28/07/1986 and Fowaz SULTAN b. 01/08/1985) and two 'ENGLISH LADIES' that work part-time. Mar SULTAN was only willing to provide limited details and kept reiterating that to his knowledge, there are no further employees at the garage. A short while later, I received another call from Farris SULTAN. Farris SULTAN was very agitated throughout the call and refused to provide substantive details. He kept repeating that I had 'NO RIGHT TO BE THERE' and 'ONLY LEGAL PEOPLE WORK HERE'. He also accused me of preventing the closure of the shop by Mr QUINN to which I explained that I was concerned about the protection of the shop whilst we waited for substantive closure as the pumps were still operational and customers were still waiting to pay for fuel. I enquired if he could attend the service station and he refused as he 'WASN'T LOCAL'. He then hung up the phone. In relation to compliance checks with the Premises Alcohol License, I then checked the CCTV system with Mr QUINN. I could see that only two cameras were operational and that the system was password protected which prevented checking the system for compliance. I then witnessed Mr. QUINN switching off various electrical items, securing and locking the premises. I ensured that I left Home Office form – Notice to Occupier in clear view on the counter containing the Power exercised in gaining entry to the premises and my details.

Further information was then provided from Home Office systems concerning a linked address to the TOTAL GARAGE. This address was \( \) \_\_\_\_\_Myself along with IO SIMPSON, IO HUGHES and IO FISH attended this address and knocked on the door only. There was no reply.

In terms of the male encountered walking across the forecourt, I had this male in view for around 5 seconds, was around 5-10ft away, the visibility was good due to good lighting conditions, there were no obstructions to my view, I have no previous knowledge of the male, I have reason to remember the male as the shop was unoccupied, I have completed this statement with events still fresh in my mind and after consulting with notes made digitally at the time.

and I then exited the shop and proceeded out of the garage site and along Dymchurch Road. I saw the previous IC4 male walking along the road and I commenced running towards him. The IC4 male became aware of my running after him and commenced running himself. He made a left turn into PALMARSH AVENUE and from my view. As I turned into PALMARSH AVENUE I continued running after the IC4 male. The pavement was lined with trees and shrubs and my view of the subject was blocked at times while pursuing him. About 100 metres along the road the pavement bent in from the road in a crescent and my view of the subject and the pavement was completely blocked by front garden shrubberies and trees/shrubs on the roadside. As I got to the crescent a couple appeared coming towards me walking their dog. I asked them if they had observed a male with a bottle of milk running the other way and they confirmed that they had. Running off PALMARSH AVENUE were a number of alleyways and cul-de-sacs, and there was a wide footpath running along the back of the houses on the avenue nearest to the garage. An extensive search of the area by myself, IOs SIMPSON, KINGSBURY and HICKS failed to locate the subject and we returned to the garage.

I later learned from OIC HALLS, who had made some enquiries and spoken with the garage owner. that the garage owner also owned a residential property in which runs off PALMARSH AVENUE. The team later went to this premises. Entry was not gained and no-one appeared to be at home. However, while parked on a resident approached the team informing that a male fitting the description of the IC4 male that had fled the garage lives in the house that was identified as belonging to the garage owner. The resident stated that she had seen the subject run across the garden/driveway of the premises and into the house. She stated that he

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

I am currently employed as an Immigration Officer and am based at FRONTIER HOUSE, 7 SHORNECLIFFE ROAD, FOLKESTONE, KENT, CT20 2SH as a member of the SOUTH EAST IMMIGRATION COMPLIANCE and ENFORCEMENT TEAM.

On 5th AUGUST 2021 I was a member of the SOUTH EAST IMMIGRATION COMPLIANCE and ENFORCEMENT TEAM to visit the TOTAL GARAGE, PALMARSH SERVICE STATION, DYMCHURCH, HYTHE, KENT, CT21 4ND. We were there to conduct an Enforcement visit based upon intelligence received of illegal working. Upon arrival we deployed directly to the garage, which was a short walk from the van. As we crossed the forecourt a MALE who I believe to be either INDIAN or PAKISTANI was walking away from the garage carrying some milk. He walked past me and several colleagues unchallenged and made his way along the road. It was quickly established upon finding an empty shop that this male was potentially the target of the visit, at which point colleagues ran after him. Unfortunately, after a sweep of the immediate area they were unable to locate him. IO FISH and I were left on site so we had a more comprehensive sweep of the building and also dealt with customers that were already on site. We found nobody else on site. Whilst there IO HALLS spoke on the phone with the business owner but was unable to locate the missing employee seen leaving the site on the teams arrival. HOME OFFICE checks made by support staff whilst the team was on site identified an address associated to the business owner where the missing employee may have fled to given the address was two minutes along the road from the garage. I travelled with the team to the newly identified address where upon arrival I knocked in an attempt to secure entry by INFORMED CONSENT. There was no answer after knocking several times. A concerned neighbour approached the van upon our return to it and advised us she had seen an INDIAN gentleman acting suspiciously, purposely trying to avoid officers in the area moments before. She also stated the same male had gone into the house where we had just knocked and had come out wearing a green/blue coat, saw the officers and fled along the road, through a neighbour's garden and out onto open land behind the property. The intelligence we were working from detailed suspected illegal working by a PAKISTANI / INDIAN male. Given the evasive behaviour displayed by the male seen leaving the premises upon our arrival, I believe the intelligence to be accurate.

I am an Immigration Officer based at the South East Immigration Compliance and Enforcement (ICE) Team, FRONTIER HOUSE, 7 SHORNCLIFFE ROAD, FOLKESTONE, KENT, CT20 2SH. On Thursday the 5<sup>th</sup> August 2021 I was on duty in Immigration Enforcement marked protective wear, at approximately 17:00 hours I attended a briefing given by Officer HALLS, also present in the briefing were Officers SIMPSON, HUGHES, SANDHAM, KINGSBURY, HICKS and TUTTON. We were advised of our intended visit TOTAL GARAGE, PALMARSH SERVICE STATION, DYMCHURCH ROAD, HYTHE, KENT, CT21 4ND based upon an allegation that there is an Indian male working illegally at the premises and that the owner is complicit in this.

At approx. 18:01 hours we arrived at the premises, it was open to the public but no staff were onsite, I searched the customer area and staff areas and found no one on site, there was evidence that someone was working there as their personal belongings had been left. At this point I was made aware that Officers had witnessed a male of South Asian appearance leaving the property with milk in his hand as the team were walking across the forecourt, I did not see this male from my positioning within the team deployment. The male had been seen to run into the residential area once away from the petrol station. I remained on site with Officer HUGHES whilst Officers HALLS, SIMPSON, KINSGBURY, HICKS, SANDHAM and TUTTON undertook a controlled foot pursuit of the suspected offender. I spoke to a customer who was waiting to pay for petrol, she advised me that the male who was witnessed to have walked offsite with milk was a worker of the petrol station. She confirmed that she recognised him as she regularly used the station for fuel. She further stated

that there were usually two males working on site, one of whom she had seen walk off, she described them to be approximately in their 40's and of possible Indian nationality but was not sure I again searched the premises to check there were no hidden spaces as it was of their names. possible that a further male was on site but did not find any persons hiding. I looked at the counter area for paperwork that would indicate who the manager was so that we could contact them and advise of the current situation. Team members started to return to the petrol station at this point as they had been unable to locate the suspect who had fled the scene. Before we had found contact details for a manager or owner a female arrived on site and claimed she had been sent by the owner to lock up the station, she did not appear comfortable with the request and seemed flustered. I referred the female to Officers HALLS and SIMSPON. A short while later a male and female arrived on site also claiming they had been sent to lock up the petrol station, the female who had arrived earlier said that she was no longer needed and left. I remained outside of the premises whilst Officers HALLS and SIMPSON liaised with the male designated to secure the locking up of the petrol station. **SUMMARY:** This report outlines the application made by Mr Demir to Vary the existing Premises Licence for this premises. The Licensing Sub-Committee must determine the outcome for the application.

### **REASONS FOR DETERMINATION:**

The Committee is asked to consider the application to Vary the Premises Licence. When considering the application the Committee must ensure they fully promote the licensing objectives. The Committee is obliged to have regard to the revised national section 182 guidance and the council's own licensing policy.

#### **DETERMINATION:**

The Licensing Sub-Committee is asked to:

- 1. Note the contents of Report DCI/21/50.
- 2. Determine the application. The options for determining the application are set out in section 4.

#### 1. BACKGROUND

1.1 The Licensing Act 2003 provides that the sale or supply of alcohol on and off the premises and other licensable activities must be authorised by a premises licence.

A premises licence holder must comply with the four licensing objectives:

- The prevention of crime and disorder
- Public Safety
- The prevention of public nuisance
- The protection of children from harm
- 1.2 From March 2016 there was a premises licence in place for 37-39 High Street as 'a family café/restaurant', the owner (Mr Halit Guner) then expanded the business to include 35-39.
- 1.3 The previous licence for 37-39 High Street permitted alcohol sales from 11:00 22:30 Monday Sunday, with opening hours until 23:00. When the premises expanded to 35-39 High Street in August 2018, a new Premises Licence was granted for a 'family run restaurant serving food and drinks', with alcohol sales from 12:00 22:30 Monday Sunday and opening hours until 23:00.
- 1.4 In December 2018 a Variation was submitted to extend the hours of alcohol sales on Friday and Saturday nights until 00:00 with opening hours until 00:30 and Late Night Refreshment until 00:00. The current licence permits Recorded Music until 22:30 on Friday and Saturday.
- 1.5 In June 2021 the Premises Licence was transferred to the current owner, Mr Ersin Demir. The current Premises Licence can be seen at Appendix 1.

#### 2. APPLICATION

2.1 In December 2021 Mr Demir submitted an application to Vary the licence to extend the alcohol sales to 00:30 Friday and Saturday and opening hours until 01:00, Late Night Refreshment until 00:30 and Recorded Music until 00:30. The application to Vary the Premises Licence can be seen at Appendix 2.

### **Annex 1- Mandatory Conditions**

#### Mandatory conditions where licence authorises supply of alcohol

- (1) Where a premises licence authorises the supply of alcohol, the licence must include the following conditions.
- (2) The first condition is that no supply of alcohol may be made under the premises licence-
  - (a) at a time when there is no designated premises supervisor in respect of the premises licence, or
  - (b) at a time when the designated premises supervisor does not hold a personal licence or his personal licence is suspended.
- (3) The second condition is that every supply of alcohol under the premises licence must be made or authorised by a person who holds a personal licence.

#### Mandatory Licensing Conditions Order 2010

- 1.—(1) The responsible person shall take all reasonable steps to ensure that staff on relevant premises do not carry out, arrange or participate in any irresponsible promotions in relation to the premises.
- (2) In this paragraph, an irresponsible promotion means any one or more of the following activities, or substantially similar activities, carried on for the purpose of encouraging the sale or supply of alcohol for consumption on the premises in a manner which carries a significant risk of leading or contributing to crime and disorder, prejudice to public safety, public nuisance, or harm to children—
- (a) games or other activities which require or encourage, or are designed to require or encourage, individuals to-
- (i) drink a quantity of alcohol within a time limit (other than to drink alcohol sold or supplied on the premises before the cessation of the period in which the responsible person is authorised to sell or supply alcohol), or
- (ii) drink as much alcohol as possible (whether within a time limit or otherwise);
- (b) provision of unlimited or unspecified quantities of alcohol free or for a fixed or discounted fee to the public or to a group defined by a particular characteristic (other than any promotion or discount available to an individual in respect of alcohol for consumption at a table meal, as defined in section 159 of the Act);
- (c) provision of free or discounted alcohol or any other thing as a prize to encourage or reward the purchase and consumption of alcohol over a period of 24 hours or less;
- (d) provision of free or discounted alcohol in relation to the viewing on the premises of a sporting event, where that provision is dependent on-
- (i) the outcome of a race, competition or other event or process, or
- (ii) the likelihood of anything occurring or not occurring;
- (e) selling or supplying alcohol in association with promotional posters or flyers on, or in the vicinity of, the premises which can reasonably be considered to condone, encourage or glamorise anti-social behaviour or to refer to the effects of drunkenness in any favourable manner.
- **2.** The responsible person shall ensure that no alcohol is dispensed directly by one person into the mouth of another (other than where that other person is unable to drink without assistance by reason of a disability).
- 3. The responsible person shall ensure that free tap water is provided on request to customers where it is reasonably available.
- **4.**—(1) The premises licence holder or club premises certificate holder shall ensure that an age verification policy applies to the premises in relation to the sale or supply of alcohol.
- (2) The policy must require individuals who appear to the responsible person to be under 18 years of age (or such older age as may be specified in the policy) to produce on request, before being served alcohol, identification bearing their photograph, date of birth and a holographic mark.
  - 5. The responsible person shall ensure that-
- (a) where any of the following alcoholic drinks is sold or supplied for consumption on the premises (other than alcoholic drinks sold or supplied having been made up in advance ready for sale or supply in a securely closed container) it is available to customers in the following measures—
- (i) beer or cider: 1/2 pint;
- (ii) gin, rum, vodka or whisky: 25 ml or 35 ml; and
- (iii) still wine in a glass: 125 ml; and
- (b) customers are made aware of the availability of these measures.

#### Mandatory condition: exhibition of films

(2) Where the film classification body is specified in the licence, unless subsection (3)(b) applies, admission of children must be restricted in accordance with any recommendation made by that body.

- (3) Where-
  - (a) the film classification body is not specified in the licence, or
  - (b) the relevant licensing authority has notified the holder of the licence that this subsection applies to the film in question,

admission of children must be restricted in accordance with any recommendation made by that licensing authority.

(4) In this section-

"children" means persons aged under 18; and

"film classification body" means the person or persons designated as the authority under section 4 of the Video Recordings Act 1984 (c.39) (authority to determine suitability of video works for classification).

#### Mandatory condition: door supervision

- (1) Where a premises licence includes a condition that at specified times one or more individuals must be at the premises to carry out a security activity, the licence must include a condition that each such individual must be licensed by the Security Industry Authority.
- (2) But nothing in subsection (1) requires such a condition to be imposed-
  - (a) in respect of premises within paragraph 8(3)(a) of Schedule 2 to the Private Security Industry Act 2001 (c.12) (premises with premises licences authorising plays or films), or
  - (b) in respect of premises in relation to-
    - (i) any occasion mentioned in paragraph 8(3)(b) or (c) of that Schedule (premises being used exclusively by club with club premises certificate, under a temporary event notice authorising plays or films or under a gaming licence), or
    - (ii) any occasion within paragraph 8(3)(d) of that Schedule (occasions prescribed by regulations under that Act).
- (3) For the purposes of this section-
  - (a) "security activity" means an activity to which paragraph 2(1)(a) of that Schedule applies, and
  - (b) paragraph 8(5) of that Schedule (interpretation of references to an occasion) applies as it applies in relation to paragraph 8 of that Schedule.

## Annex 2 - Conditions Consistent with the Operating Schedule

#### Genera

As this is a family restaurant, the aim is to ensure that every person on the premises feels safe and under protection of experienced and skilled staff capable handling any problem which might arise.

#### Prevention of Crime and Disorder

CCTV will enable staff to see persons outside the premises to identify possible problems. No person will be allowed to enter the premises if they appear to be unruly, badly behaved or intoxicated. No persons will be served alcohol if they appear intoxicated or if the staff feel that they have drank more than would be reasonable. The police will be notified if any person leaving he premises appears likely to cause an incident. ID will be requested if anyone is thought to be under the age of 25 (Challenge 25).

#### **Public Safety**

Staff will ensure that any spillage is cleared immediately and that passageways and exits are kept clear at all times. The main and emergency exits will be clearly marked. Staff are trained to operate fire extinguishers and, in this respect there are ample facilities to handle any fire in the kitchen area. Fire aid facilities are always readily available. There is ample lighting in the toilet areas and these areas are regularly checked to ensure they do not constitute any hazard.

#### Prevention Public Nuisance

No alcohol will be served where an intended purchaser appears intoxicated. Staff have instructions to contact the police immediately should any individual become aggressive, agitated, abusive or acting in a manner which they perceive as being unlawful or likely to cause an affray.


#### Protection of Children from Harm

This is very much a family restaurant, the safety of children at all times is of prime concern. For this reason, Children under 12 years of age must be accompanied by an adult, no alcoholic drinks will be served to anybody under 18 years of age. Evidence of age will be required on request of any alcoholic drinks where the person concerned appears to be under 25 years of age. Challenge 25 posters will be on display. Special seating is available for younger children and absolute cleanliness is a strict rule of business.

## **Dear Licensing Team**

I would like to object to the proposed variation (PR202201-73903) to the premises Licence for the Sunshine Restaurant, 35-39 High Street, Hythe, Kent, CT21 5AD

We live in a cottage just behind the Sunshine Restaurant. We have already experienced the noise of the music from the restaurant after midnight as they were playing loud music after midnight in the few weeks running up to Christmas (we weren't here at Xmas or the New Year).

I imagine when the building was refurbished as a restaurant, little or no consideration was given to mitigating any sound pollution if it were an entertainment venue but the restaurant appears to be changing the nature of its business, for at least some days of the week, from a restaurant to a late night entertainment venue/club.

You can easily hear the music in our main bedroom and it is difficult to sleep when the music is playing. The restaurant has a very loud kitchen extractor fan at the rear of the building and the music can be heard & felt above the noise of the extractor fan. The base notes from the music are easily felt in our living room and bedrooms.

The extension to the opening times and the extension for the playing of music will cause annoyance and disrupt the sleep of near-by neighbours who already have to endure the loud noise & smell from the restaurant's extraction fan. The late night toing & froing of people & cars in the high street and lane by our house plus the sound and bass notes from the music after 10:30pm to after midnight will be happening when people are quite reasonably expecting to be able to sleep. An entertainment venue that is playing loud music needs to be sited further away from neighbouring residents so the noise and disruption doesn't annoy their neighbours. The centre of Hythe is built on a medieval street plan. The buildings are tightly packed and so residents & businesses need to take into account the tightly packed nature of the building on and around the High Street. A restaurant in the High Street is a reasonable business to expect, though it would be kinder if their extraction fan was a little quieter and a little more efficient at clearing the smell from the kitchens, but it isn't right that they morph themselves into an entertainment venue/club in such a location.

I am a neighbour close to the restaurant. I have made numerous complaints regarding the noise from the customers staff and the music. There are frequent physical fights which I have reported to the police, one of which involved two of the staff members punching each other close to my front door. Heavy dance music is already played until late and the types of customers this already attracts is concerning for a lovely town like Hythe. Marijuana is smoked outside, customers who are drunk regularly urinate outside my door and they use the alleyway to smoke. It's out of control already and extending the hours is completely shocking to me. It's a restaurant and it acts as a club and brings intimidating people causing trouble. Fighting and screaming arguments are a regular occurrence which always wakes my family. I have seen and heard violence from the customers who hang around outside on the street or outside my door to smoke. I strongly hope the hours are not extended. Its very tough for us all as it is. All the neighbours are constantly worried and complaining as it is. It's very unfair, its meant to be a restaurant not a nightclub.

There has also been parents turning up shouting at the staff many times, one of which was hitting the staff saying the staff got their underage child drunk and take them home or they try to be intimate with them in the toilet after getting them drunk giving them free drinks. There is a bouncer at the door due to the trouble that occurs. My neighbours are too intimidated to say anything. The staff at the sunshine restaurant and the cafe opposite are a huge family and are all men working together. I can't tell you how many times music of heavy drum and bass are still playing at 2 in the morning. It attracts a lot of people from out of Hythe who fight as well. They advertise their disco nights on Facebook and its a lovely restaurant, I can't believe they now basically use it as a club. I have called the police out so many times. The restrictions on music and alcohol currently in place aren't stuck to as it is. It's very distressing as it happens midweek as well as weekends. I don't know how my

neighbours who live directly above the restaurant have coped. Everyone constantly worries about the violence but a lot of people don't like to speak up. I have also complained to the council regarding the noise on the website many times before.

I really don't want to move as I love where I live however I'm worried it's going to get even more out of control come summer time as that's when it's worse.
