#### SUBJECT: FOLKESTONE & HYTHE DISTRICT HIGH SREETS FUND

#### SUMMARY:

This report proposes to extend the Folkestone and Hythe High Street Fund initiative for external grant applications due to the impact of the coronavirus lockdown on its delivery.

#### **REASONS FOR RECOMMENDATION:**

The Leader is asked to agree to the recommendations so that the initiative can continue beyond the end date that was originally envisaged when the Cabinet decision was made.

#### **RECOMMENDATIONS:**

- 1. To receive and note Report C/20/87.
- 2. To agree to extend the High Street Fund initiative for external applications to 31 March 2022 or until the funds have been allocated.

## 1. INTRODUCTION

1.1. The Cabinet of Folkestone & Hythe District Council approved in February 2019 (Cabinet C/19/21) the establishment of a £3 million fund of earmarked reserves to support high streets across the district "looking to deal with a number of adverse pressures". The mechanism for investing and managing this fund was subsequently agreed by Cabinet in September 2019 (Cabinet C/18/74).

### 2. THE FOLKESTONE & HYTHE HIGH STREETS FUND (HSF)

- 2.1. The key uses of the HSF are to (a) take forward major capital investments opportunities and other initiatives led by F&HDC to help transform Folkestone town centre, the largest town in the district; and to (b) provide contributory funding to external organisations to take forward initiatives to address issues and improve Folkestone and other key High Streets in the district.
- 2.2. In September 2019 Cabinet agreed to £2.2 million of District HSF being allocated to Folkestone town centre and the remaining £800,000 to be made available to ten other high streets across the district at Cheriton, Sandgate, Hythe, New Romney, Lydd, Hawkinge, Dymchurch, Elham, Lyminge and Sellindge.
- 2.3. To external organisations the HSF provides grants of £5,000 to £50,000 towards individual projects that will improve the above high streets, and in normal circumstances this is expected to comprise a maximum of 50% of the total project cost.
- 2.4. Cabinet (C/18/74) agreed that 'the scheme will run until either 31st March 2021 or until the funds are allocated'. However, as a result of the pandemic which has resulted in national lockdowns and periods of Tier 3 and Tier 4 restrictions since March 2020, there has been some delay in the progress of the initiative and the expected level of spend.

#### 3. PROGRESS TO DATE

3.1. There has been progress in both elements of the HSF – external applications to the fund and FHDC-led initiatives, to date.

#### HSF grants to businesses and partner organisations

3.2. The table below summarises the external applications made to the HSF. This shows the number of applications that have been agreed across the high streets of the district, those that have been rejected or withdrawn, applications still pending revisions and new applications made recently that are awaiting consideration by the Decision Panel.

- 3.3. In summary the table above shows that:
  - Just over £280,000 has been awarded to businesses and organisations in Folkestone for improvements to the high street and this has levered in an additional 117% of investment by the private sector or other organisations.
  - For a further six high streets across the district, grants amounting to £188,000 have been awarded, with Hythe, Dymchurch and New Romney receiving the largest amounts at circa £60,000, £36,000 and £25,000 respectively.
  - There are a further19 new applications awaiting consideration and are seeking grant funding of around £365,000, which are focused on Folkestone, Sandgate New Romney and Hythe.
- 3.4. Overall, almost £650,000 of high streets funding to external organisations has been approved to date. Together with the amount being sought in new projects this amounts to just over £835,400 with 54% of this funding potentially being directed to Folkestone and 46% to other high streets in the district.
- 3.5. A short summary of the external projects supported to date is set out in Appendix A.

#### FHDC-led Folkestone Town Centre Initiatives and Investments

- 3.6. There are a number of initiatives that are being taken forward by FHDC in Folkestone town centre and these include:
  - Acquisition of the building vacated by Debenhams when it announced its closure in 2018 and work to consider future uses for the building.
  - Supporting printing and installation of window vinyls for the vacated Debenhams the Folca building.
  - Public realm improvements including an ongoing planting scheme for Sandgate Road, heritage street lighting and street signage schemes (all in conjunction with Folkestone Independent Retail Regeneration Group).
  - Introduction of a new market offer Vegan Veganism trading once a month in Guildhall Street.

3.7. The table below summarises the allocation of funding from the HSF towards these initiatives to date.

- 3.8. In January 2021, We Made That were commissioned to develop a Place Plan for Folkestone Town Centre over the coming months with a final report expected to highlight other initiatives that could be brought forward utilising the High Street Fund.
- 3.9. Looking at both the current HSF grant commitments to external organisations and the commitments to FHDC-led initiatives for Folkestone town centre, some £1.23 million of the £3 million High Streets Fund has been committed to date. If all new grant applications are also considered, this rises to almost £1.6 million.
- 3.10. The Cabinet decision allocated 80% (£2.2 million) of the High Streets Fund to Folkestone town centre and the remainder to other high streets in the district. Based on the current level of commitments some £1.04 million of the current commitments are in Folkestone which rises to £1.21million if the new grant applications are taken into account.
- 3.11. While there has been good progress with the High Streets Fund initiatives, the impact of the pandemic has caused delays. It is therefore recommended that the districts High Streets Fund remains open to external applications for grant funding to 31 March 2022 or until all the funds have been allocated.

#### 4. LEGAL, FINANCIAL AND OTHER CONTROLS/POLICY MATTERS

#### Legal Officer's comments (NM)

4.1. There are no legal implications associated with the recommendations in this report. However, any grants that are made available to third parties by FHDC will need to be legally documented and the legal team can assist with this

#### Finance Officer's comments (DH)

- 4.2. Should the recommendation that the High Streets Fund remain open to external applicants until 31/03/2022 or until all the funds have been allocated be approved, the uncommitted balance of reserves is £961,592 (after the estimated £800k of projects for 21/22 as advised by Katharine Harvey as part of 21/22 budget setting), this can be drawn on for further grant funding should the estimated £800k of projects for 21/22 be exhausted.
- 4.3. There is also an approx. £155K of the original £468,410 of the £3 million reserve that was transferred to the 20/21 revenue budget (High Street Fund ED14) remaining, unspent in 20/21 due to the pandemic. The £155K can be carried forward to 21/22 (High Street Fund ED14) and be allocated to further grant expenditure.

# Appendix A: External projects to date supported by the F&H HSF

A total of 33 external grants have been awarded district wide. Below is a summary of the projects successfully delivered with a F&H High Street Fund grant award.

# Folkestone

The fund supported the complete renovation of a local Mexican restaurant in line with granted planning permission which included the installation of toilet facilities for disabled people.

Expanded CCTV programme for Cheriton (complete) and Folkestone Town Centre (underway). Enabling CSU member's direct access. Grant awarded £50,000 Match funding 38%

# Dymchurch

Levelling and resurfacing the entire Parish Council Car Park used extensively by users of the high street. Improving user safety by removing pot holes and increasing capacity by marking car parking bays; also encouraging greener journeys with the provision of an electric car charging point. Grant awarded £27,000 Match funding 50%

As part of a wider refurbishment programme of Martello 24, funding was awarded for new educational displays and a scaled model of the tower as part of the enhancement of visitor experience.
